RE: BLM Methane and Waste Prevention Rule

Dear Members of the United States Senate,

We write to you today regarding the BLM Methane and Waste Prevention Rule. As executives in the outdoor recreation industry we approach this issue from both the business and the environmental perspective.

Our companies are part of the \$646 billion outdoor industry and we are bringing jobs to communities across the country in many ways. Recreation visitors bring needed dollars to cities and towns that have recreation assets like rivers, trails, and other outdoor spaces where fishing, hunting, boating, hiking, biking, climbing and a long list of other outdoor activities take place. Second, companies like ours, both large and small, are choosing to locate in these communities because our employees want to live in places with access to the great outdoors.

Across the country, communities that have previously depended upon resource extraction have begun to diversify into recreation and it is regulations like the Methane Rule that make this possible. By implementing best practices and using newly developed technologies we can:
